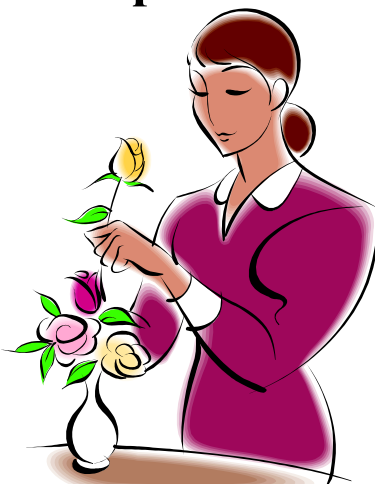
Remember - your payment of \$28 per person is your reservation and must be received no later than February 3rd. No reservations can be accepted after that date.

The following are the instructions for the floral arrangement competition held at the February Luncheon:

- * All arrangements should be suitable for round tables to seat 10.
- * Height of the arrangement should be no more than 15 inches.
- * Materials should be natural. Use real flowers and greenery. Dried materials and moss are acceptable.
- * Some theme suggestions include shells, driftwood, fern, birds, frogs, fish, and boats.

January Speaker

In spite of the frigid temperatures outside, Cassina members were inspired to plan for color in their gardens when Norman Winter, syndicated horticultural columnist in newspapers and magazines, showed the Club slides of beautiful color combinations. He described the effects of monochromatic, analogous, and complementary color schemes



with multiple examples of each triadic harmony with three colors of flowers. Norman recommended Sweet Potato Vines, the new Cora Vinca, Sweet Alyssum, Diamond Frost Euphorbia, and Sun Patiens as strong candidates for the Georgia garden. He suggested that flowers paired with grasses make a bold statement.

On February 12th our Tabby Slave Cabins will be open to visitors for a special event. February is designated as Black History month, and our Historic Tabby Slave Cabins are a very prominent part of our island’s black history. We will be cooperating on this day with the Friends of Harrington School not only as part of black history emphasis but to also help aid them in raising awareness of this group’s efforts to restore the only remaining black school house on our island. The cabins will be open in the morning from 10 a.m. until 12 noon. There will be an African American singing group performing at the cabins at 10:30 a.m. and docents will be present to share the history of our cabins and showcase our artifact exhibits. Afternoon activities will be at the Harrington School House grounds with their volunteers present and a performance at 2 p.m. by the Brunswick Shouters group. Plan to come by the cabins in the morning or the school in the afternoon to help us showcase our cabins and support these additional preservation efforts on our island.

Pruning

Make spring's pruning chores easy on your hands and on your plants by sharpening dull blades now. There is a special metal file you can buy if you want to try to do this yourself. If you have especially good tools, you may want to take them to have them sharpened professionally. Blades do need to be re-sharpened often.



Heavy pruning for size and shape may be accomplished this month on all but spring flowering shrubs and trees. Prune out all dead, injured and diseased branches. Remove unsightly shoots and suckers at the base. Prune out long branches deep within the body of the plant to obtain a natural look. A popular method of pruning badly overgrown shrubs is to cut all branches back to within a foot of the ground. This may require a heavy saw. Vigorous new growth must then be lightly pruned and reshaped in June. February is also rose pruning month. February 14th is a key pruning day for rose growers.

Planting

February is a great month for planting both trees and shrubs. Roses may also be planted now and the garden centers should have bare rooted ones at this time. Also, rapidly maturing cool season vegetables such as lettuce, garden peas, radishes, carrots, spinach and plants of cabbage, cauliflower, and onions can be put out if done early in the month to allow for produce before the hot summer weather arrives.

Remember to fertilize your shade trees and flowering trees this month. Scatter a balanced fertilizer beneath and slightly beyond the spread of the branches. Be sure to water well.

Special Tip

Our Cassina friend James Holland, former Altamaha Riverkeeper, passes along this information. He suggests that we may want to rethink using Cypress chips for mulching. To produce these chips, vast areas of Cypress swamps must be cut. Cypress is a very slow growing tree and without them the swamps are in trouble. These trees help control flooding and also provide shade for breeding fish. You may want to consider buying pine products instead. Pines are fast growing and are produced mainly for cutting and selling.
