

### Arbor Day



## Garden Walk



## Garden Query by Frances Allen



**Muhly grass** belongs to a genus of perennial grasses named in honor of the American amateur botanist Gotthilf Heinrich Ernst Muhlenberg. There are around 155 species. Showy and easy to grow, these native U.S. grasses combine handsome, slender leaves with eye-catching flower plumes that typically appear in late summer and fall. Plants tolerate heat and drought, but they look better and grow larger if given supplemental water. Good drainage is a must.

Gulf Muhly is native to the Southeast. Young leaves are used by the Gullah people of South Carolina to make traditional baskets. It is called sweet grass because of its pleasant fragrance like freshly mown hay.



Ilex Rotunday, also known as **Lord's Holly**, is an evergreen shrub and tree, believed to have been a mutation that was propagated by Mr. Baumgardner. I first saw it as a tree in the parking lot at the Sea Island Golf Course. There is one at Albert Fendig's home. This picture is from Mary Burdell's mailbox in Sea Palms. Male plants are needed to produce the large red berries.

As a side note, the **tung oil tree** has died. It was located on the property of IDAC building next to Frederica House parking lot.



## Freeze Warning!!

- Pick ALL fruit – do not leave any citrus on the trees.
- Take hanging and potted plants into a sheltered area, e.g., garage.
- Pots that you cannot move – drape a blanket or sheet over the plant **and make sure the covering touches the ground 360 degrees around the entire plant.**



- Do **NOT** use your sprinkler system and try to frost/freeze protect the plants. This will actually super cool the plants and make them even colder.
- Have about 3 inches of mulch around your plants. This keeps the heat in the ground which protects the roots.
- PLEASE consider your pets and treat them appropriately. Give them shelter and extra food. Don't forget to break the ice out of their water dish and refill.
