

Community Outreach

Based on the record-breaking success of the 2008 Christmas Tour and the 2009 Garden Walk, the Community Outreach and Finance Committees recommended to the Board at the September meeting that Cassina make donations this year in the amount of \$26,400. Anne Aspinwall reports that to help celebrate Cassina's legacy, and the 25th year of the Christmas Tour of Homes, the committee decided to present a little island history to our visitors. In addition to viewing inspiring holiday decorations, our visitors will learn about who originally owned the land where each home is located. The plantations represented are West Point, Hamilton, Hampton, Rosemont (Black Banks), and an original land grant to Christ Church by General James Oglethorpe. The historic Tea Cabin will also be showcased with docent tours and holiday refreshments.

The special stop this year will be at Wesley United Methodist Church at Frederica. Visitors will view a collection of decorated trees and wreaths, enjoy refreshments and even hear Christmas music by the Church Choir. Horticultural Highlights



This month the shorter days and cooler nights make being in the garden far more pleasant. Almost as much planting can be done now as in the spring. This is also a great time to collect seeds for planting next year and to collect dried grasses and flower heads for winter arrangements.

Lawns: If weeds were a problem last year, early October is the time to apply a pre-emergence herbicide. Do not use a pre-emergence herbicide if you plan to overseed the lawn with rye grass. As last month, watch for brown patch fungus disease and chinch bug damage.

Trees and Shrubs: Cooler fall weather is a perfect time to plant new shrubs and trees. This gives time for root growth that will support spring growth. Root prune any shrubs you plant to transplant this winter.

Christmas Blooms: To insure blooms on your Christmas cactus, the plants should receive no artificial light during October nights. This signals the plants to set buds. Some say the plant should be in the dark from 5 p.m. to 8 a.m.

Annuals: The end of October is the time to plant annuals for winter color. Pansies, petunias, calendula, snapdragons, sweet alyssum, and lobelia do well in our winters, as do some of the decorative cabbages and kales. If planted too early while the weather is still very warm, these plants will bolt and bloom too early.

Perennials: Perennials planted now will bloom more profusely in the spring. Biennial and perennial herbs such as parsley, thyme, sage, and rosemary should be planted now.

- Approved additional \$20,000 for Cabin self-insurance fund (new total, \$50,000)
- Approved 2009-2010 Budget
- Approved Standing Rule change: Page 64, II. Committees;
 - A. Standing Committees; #2: *At the death of a club member, who has shown dedication to the Club's mission through service and effort, the Chairman shall plant either a Gerbing (white) or Taber (pink) azalea in the Memorial Garden in that member's memory.*
- Approved purchase of new energy efficient refrigerator for Tea Cabin (The small refrigerator "died" this summer.)
- Approved installation of two outside electrical outlets at cost of \$250. They will be located near existing electrical meters on both Cabins
