*A Comment on the Increased Price of the Luncheon: The decision to increase the price of the luncheon required great discussion at both our January Board and Regular meetings. A bit of history might help us understand the reasoning behind this decision:*

*Three years ago – at our last luncheon in the “old” Cloister, the meal was priced at \$25.00 and Cassina absorbed about \$0.50/person of the additional cost. Two years ago, a quote from the King and Prince for \$27.50 + tax & gratuity, caused us to move the luncheon to the Parish Hall at St. Williams to keep the charge to \$25.00/person. The actual cost turned out to be \$24.93. Last year, still at St. Williams, the charge for lunch remained \$25.00/person but it actually cost us \$26.96 so Cassina lost nearly \$2.00 per meal. Costs have continued to escalate. We must rent linens (no longer available at cost through St. Williams), china, glassware, etc. and pay a modest honorarium to our speaker. As a result, your Board reluctantly approved the \$30 per member charge and a \$40 guest fee. I hope this helps.*

### GARDEN UPDATE by Frances Allen

We have a new well at the cabins! Drilled by Woodrow Sapp Co. They will be finishing the connections to the cabins this week. The water pressure is wonderful. Since the cabins are still on our own septic system, please do not pour anything down the commode that will harm our tank or leaching fields.

We have had a very mild winter and as a result, the pansies, snapdragons and petunias have faired well so far. Our garden design is a work in progress and we will see what will come back this spring. Some plants need to be moved around. We will continue to have the beds divided for weeding and maintenance. This has worked well – it is not a burden for anyone if you take care of your area on a regular basis. You may keep your same section. If you did not have a section, I will have a sign up sheet available at the Luncheon or just call me, 634-1410, and I will put your name down to reserve your plot.

It is still too early to turn the soil in the beds and prepare for the spring planting, but do check for weeds. I welcome suggestions that you may have for the design of the beds and around the cabins. We all have different ideas that need to be heard.

The plant I want to bring to your attention is the GRAND CRINUM (*Crinum asiaticum*). This is the huge lily in front of the grape arbor given to us by Denise Trethaway last year. The Crinum has evergreen foliage but will die back after a hard freeze. However, mulching over the neck of the bulbs in winter brings them back in spring. Growing 3 to 4 feet tall, Grand Crinum bears up to 50 fragrant, white flowers in a single cluster. The Grand Crinum cultivar is the largest and slowest variety to off-set. The mother plant throws off several hundred bulblets instead of seed to start new plants. These bulblets take several years to bloom but your patience will be rewarded. Crinums become showier with time, so there is no need to divide clumps, unless you want plants for other locations.
